

Hope

"Hope" is the thing with feathers That perches in the soul -And sings the tune without the words -And never stops - at all -

~ Emily Dickinson

We must accept finite disappointment, but never lose infinite hope. ~Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr.

Hope is the pillar that holds up the world. Hope is the dream of a waking man. ~Pliny the Elder

But for those of us working to follow Christ, perhaps, Paul says it best.

He certainly says it over and over in Romans: Not only so, but we also glory in our sufferings, because we know that suffering produces perseverance; perseverance, character; and character, hope (5:3 & 4).

Romans 12:12 ~ *Rejoice in hope, be patient in tribulation, be constant in prayer.*

Romans 8:24-25 ~ For in this hope we were saved. Now hope that is seen is not hope. For who hopes for what he sees? But if we hope for what we do not see, we wait for it with patience.

And in his letter to the Hebrews, Paul talks about hope based on the enduring promises of God.

For God is not unjust; Paul assures us, he will not overlook your work and the love that you showed for his sake in serving the saints, as you still do. ¹¹ And we want each one of you to show the same diligence, so as to realize the full assurance of hope to the very end, ¹² so that you may not become sluggish, but imitators of those who through faith and patience inherit the promises (Hebrews 6: 10-12). Paul continues:

Human beings, of course, swear by someone greater than themselves, and an oath given as confirmation puts an end to all dispute. ¹⁷ In the same way, when God desired to show even more clearly to the heirs of the promise the unchangeable character of his purpose, he guaranteed it by an oath, ¹⁸ so that through two unchangeable things, in which it is impossible that God would prove false, we who have taken refuge might be strongly encouraged to seize the hope set before us.

¹⁹ We have this hope, a sure and steadfast anchor of the soul, a hope that enters the inner shrine behind the curtain, ²⁰ where Jesus, a forerunner on our behalf, has entered, having become a high priest for ever.... (Hebrews 6: 16-20).

Seize the hope set before us! That feels like words to live by. *Seize the hope set before us...* because once again...it's not about us...it's about God. We have Jesus "a forerunner on our behalf".

So, just like we can love because God first loved us, so we can have hope based on the promises of God. It's not about our piety, our worthiness, our goodness...it's about God's goodness. It's about Jesus.

And I don't know about you, but I'm always relieved whenever I'm reassured that it's not about us.

And this morning, we learn that the crowds are gathering. They are following Jesus because he is healing people. He gives sight to the blind; he lifts the lame so they walk again. And the crowd grows, and now it's a "large crowd". John tells us there are thousands.

And it's getting late and it's time to eat and the crowd is hungry, but where is a store to buy food for all of these people, and how would we ever raise enough money to buy all that's needed?

Then John tells us: One of his disciples, Andrew, Simon Peter's brother, said to him, 9 'There is a boy here who has five barley loaves and two fish. But what are they among so many people?' ¹⁰ Jesus said, 'Make the people sit down.'

Now there was a great deal of grass in the place; so they sat down, about five thousand in all.

Then Jesus took the loaves, and when he had given thanks, he distributed them to those who were seated; so also the fish, as much as they wanted.

When they were satisfied, he told his disciples, 'Gather up the fragments left over, so that nothing may be lost.' ¹³ So they gathered them up, and from the fragments of the five barley loaves, left by those who had eaten, they filled twelve baskets.

When the people saw the sign that he had done, they began to say, 'This is indeed the prophet who is to come into the world.'

We know this story. We've heard it before, but how amazing to take it in again—twelve baskets of leftovers! *Seize the hope set before us!* God's grace is abundant.

Seize hope. Expect miracles.

Now, as modern folk, we may wrestle a bit here and there with miracles. We may be discouraged in our faith, living in a world that scoffs at the miraculous and has so much respect for the cold, hard facts. We've been watching a whole lot of CSI.

We know it's only the evidence that doesn't lie.

We may be left doing a balancing act in a world that no longer expects the miraculous. Yet, the feeding of the five thousand is a great illustration not only of the miraculous but also of God's bounty.

Seize hope. Expect miracles. Believe in abundance.

The crowd is hungry. Where will they buy so much bread?

'There is a boy here who has five barley loaves and two fish. But what are they among so many people?' ¹⁰ Jesus said, 'Make the people sit down.' Now there was a great deal of grass in the place; so they sat down, about five thousand in all (6:9 & 10).

Jesus told them to sit down, and he gave thanks to God Almighty—just as He will at the Last Supper, and he distributed the loaves among the hungry thousands, and John tells us:

When they were satisfied, he told his disciples, 'Gather up the fragments left over, so that nothing may be lost.' ¹³ So they gathered them up, and from the fragments of the five barley loaves, left by those who had eaten, they filled twelve baskets. ¹⁴ When the people saw the sign that he had done, they began to say, 'This is indeed the prophet who is to come into the world' (6:12 & 13).

Seize hope. Expect miracles. Believe in abundance, for with Jesus nothing may be lost.

There are a few postmodern scholars who suggest the feeding of the five thousand, which is recorded in all of the Gospels, may have been a "stone soup" kind of miracle. Do you remember the story of the stone soup?

In a hungry town that had very few resources, a man puts a stone in a big pot of water, puts it over a fire and declares that he is making "Stone Soup". If only he had an onion, he muses to the gathering townspeople, the soup would be perfect. And someone comes up with an onion.

Soon others are contributing to the stone soup and when folks start to share the little bits and pieces they have, a real pot of soup is created and the whole town eats.

Skeptics may appreciate that interpretation of events. They're looking for a logical explanation for how two fish and five loaves of bread fed thousands of people.

But a logical explanation takes some of the magic out of the story for me. Jesus becomes a little more human and far less Divine, and for the record, I don't need a logical explanation. I've dated too many men to worship one of them. Yet, perhaps either way you look at it—there's a miracle passing through the crowd that day along with the loaves and the fishes.

And the feeding of the five thousand is just the beginning.

Later, after his disciples left to cross the lake to Capernaum:

the lake became rough because a strong wind was blowing. ¹⁹ When they had rowed about three or four miles, they saw Jesus walking on the lake and coming near the boat, and they were terrified. ²⁰ But he said to them, 'It is I; do not be afraid' (6:18-20).

Jesus came to the boat walking across the water. This one may be a bit harder for the skeptics to explain—even the disciples were freaked out at this one. John tells us they were "terrified". "It is I, do not be afraid" Jesus assures them, like he has so many times, and then the boat is at shore (6:20).

Performing miracle after miracle, sign after sign, Jesus healed them; he fed them; he walked among them

Seize hope. Expect miracles. Believe in abundance. It's all about Jesus.

When the people saw the sign that he had done, they began to say, 'This is indeed the prophet who is to come into the world.'

The people who ate the loaves and fishes and witnessed twelve bushels of leftovers being gathered that nothing would be lost—the people are so impressed with Jesus they want *to take him by force to make him king*. How impressed are we?

Do we believe in miracles? Are we ready to: Seize hope. Expect miracles. Believe in abundance.

Because it's all about Jesus, and when we expect miracles...we'll get miracles. Amen.

Will you pray with me? O God of miracles, help us to believe. Help us to grow in faith, walk in obedience and trust in your promises this hour and all the days of our lives. Amen.
