



"Faith Beats Deception"

(Read Mark 13: 1-8)

This is the Word of God for the people of God! Thanks be to God! Let us pray:

Father God, we thank You for Your patience with us and Your indefatigable love for us. Lord, help us to not be deceived by those who come in Your Son's name who are not of Your Son. It is in Your Son's Name that we pray. Amen.

"Teacher, see what manner of stones and what buildings are here!" one of Jesus's disciples says to Him. This disciple and his fellow disciples are small-town boys from rural Galilee who are now in the big city of Jerusalem. And nothing is bigger in this big city than the Temple, the center of Jewish life in the first century A.D.

This disciple is awe-struck by the Temple's size and splendor! And you know what? If any of us could have seen the great Temple, we, too, would have been blown away, for the Temple was one of the most majestic manmade structures of the ancient world. The Book of Ezra in the Old Testament tells of the Temple being rebuilt following its destruction by the Babylonians. Then in 19 B.C., King Herod- the same King Herod whom Matthew told us had slaughtered the innocents in Bethlehem in his failed attempt to kill the Boy Jesus- began lavishly remodeling the Temple. Taking more than 80 years, the Temple was eventually completed in 63 A.D., so it was still a work in progress when Jesus was crucified in 33 A.D. It was nearly 500 yards long and 400 yards wide. The outside of the Temple was decorated with gold plates. The Jewish historian Josephus wrote that when the sun shone on the Temple, the brilliance of the gold plates could be blinding.

This disciple tries to draw Jesus into his excitement, but our Lord and Savior is having none of it. That is because Jesus sees the Temple's doomed future, so its opulence fails to impress Him. Jesus knows that in the year 70 A.D., nearly four decades after His crucifixion, the occupying Roman army will brutally put down a violent rebellion by Jewish militants. As the Roman soldiers bloodily clash with the Jewish rebels, one drunken Roman soldier decides to start a fire inside the Temple. Historians say that although it was Rome's intention to put down the insurrection in the most severe way that they could, it was never their intention to destroy the Temple. But once that one drunken Roman soldier started the fire, it sparked a frenzy of destruction in the already enflamed hearts of the Roman army. They eventually leveled the Temple and, as Jesus prophesied, not one stone was left upon another.

By the time that we get to Mark 13: 3, Jesus is sitting atop the Mount of Olives, apparently enjoying the serene view overlooking the temple mount. Four of His disciples are sitting with Him: Peter, his younger brother Andrew, James and his younger brother John. These four disciples are still trying to picture this huge and breathtaking Temple being destroyed, so they ask Jesus: "When will this happen? What will be the signs before it happens?" For the remainder of the thirteenth chapter of Mark's Gospel, Jesus reveals what biblical scholars call the Olivet Discourse, so named because He describes the turbulent times to come while His disciples are still alive, as well as the end times, which are yet to come or could already be here, depending on your perspective.

In Mark 13: 6, Jesus says, "For many will come in My name, saying, 'I am He,' and will deceive many." Jesus's use of the word "many" is sobering. He uses it twice in this verse. There will be many claiming to be Jesus, and, in turn, there will be many who will be deceived by them.

So how does a follower of Christ in today's world keep from being deceived? We must be able to tell the real Jesus from someone who merely says, "I am He." But how do we do that? How are we going to know the real Jesus when we see Him?

I think that we have to keep going back to Matthew, Mark, Luke and John. If you have read the Four Gospels then great, but I believe that we have to keep reading them again and again. Each time, we learn something new. I believe that is the best way, besides remaining diligent in our prayers, to get to know the real Jesus because the Gospels enlighten us on His character and on His heart. If we know the character and the heart of Jesus, that will keep us from being deceived by someone saying, "I am He."

I have said this before during the Sundays that I have filled in for the pastor that when I first read the Four Gospels for myself many years ago when I was a young man, I was rather sensitive to the number of times that Jesus struck me as being possibly aloof when someone would tell Jesus that he wanted to follow Him. I mean, this one man invited Jesus to stay in his home. A pretty generous offer, I think! But Jesus said, "The foxes have dens, and the birds have nests, but the Son of Man has nowhere to lay His head."

"What kind of answer is that?" I thought. And then there was the man who told Jesus that he would gladly follow Him, but he wanted to bury his father first. A reasonable request, I thought. But Jesus told him, "Let the dead bury the dead." I thought, "Ouch!" the first time that I read that. And then a few Sundays ago, the Gospel lesson was on the young rich man who asked Jesus what he had to do to inherit eternal life. Jesus began listing some of the Ten Commandments. The young rich man beamed and said that he has kept the commandments ever since he was a boy! And then the Gospel writers noted something very special, I think. They wrote that "Jesus loved him." That reminds us that despite how challenging and sometimes how confusing Jesus's answers could be, He was never being rude. He was never putting anyone down. He loves us! So much so, that He willingly died for our sins. He loves us so much that He challenges us to examine ourselves to see what is separating us from God. Jesus told the young rich man to sell all that he had and to follow Him. Jesus knew what was separating the youngrich man from God. Sure, the young rich man was keeping God's commandments. But he loved his wealth more than he loved God.

Note that Jesus challenged those who desired to follow Him. He did not tell them what they wanted to hear. I guarantee you that the young rich man did not want to hear that he needed to let go of his wealth! A false Messiah, by contrast, will tell everyone what they want to hear. That will be how they will deceive so many, as Jesus pointed out. How does an unscrupulous salesman sell his product? Does he tell his would-be clients, "What I am selling is pure junk"? No, he tells them that what he is selling will do for them exactly what they want it to do. The seeds of deception are sown by telling someone only what he wants to hear.

The Gospels also inform us that mercy, forgiveness and love are at the core of Jesus' character. Will a false Messiah pray for His enemies? Jesus asked His Father to forgive His tormentors while He was dying on the cross. He also told us that when we pray, if we have anything against anyone, we should forgive that person, just as we want God to forgive us of our sins.

Knowing the real Jesus will better safeguard us from those who falsely claim His Name. Keep reading Matthew, Mark, Luke and John. They will tell you all that there is to know about the real Messiah. The false Messiahs will tell us what we want to hear. Jesus, on the other hand, tells us what we need to know in order to have eternal life. Genuine faith will triumph over deception.

In the Name of the Father, the Son, and the Holy Spirit! Amen!
