"These Three: The Essentials" By Tom Geddens

Scripture Reading: 1st Corinthians 13: 1-13

This is the Word of God for the people of God! Thanks be to God! Let us pray: Father God, help me, please, with the words that I will speak. Blessed Father, remind us to always abide faith, hope and love. It is in Jesus's Holy Name that we pray. Amen.

Boy, it doesn't get much better than those verses that we just heard, right? 1st Corinthian 13 is one of the most well-known chapters in the Bible. Many of you probably had it read at your wedding. It is one of my favorite chapters in the Bible. 1st Corinthians 13 contains some of the most beautiful and eloquent words that Paul ever wrote. But for my message today, the focus will be on the final verse of that chapter: 1st Corinthians 13:13, when Paul writes, "And now abide faith, hope, love, these three; but the greatest of these is love."

And while I focus on that one verse, I will talk at length about two of the three virtues that Paul considers essential for a Christian, so much so that you may think that I am overlooking one of the three. But I will get to that one virtue as well.

I want to begin with an observation that I have had. Some of you may have had the same observation. That observation is that some folks ostensibly abide by faith, but not so much love, while others are great at abiding by love but not so much by faith.

I will begin with the people in the first category. Many of us know people who seem to have a very strong faith. They read the Bible. They pray to God. They attend church every Sunday. They show reverence for the Cross. They know the Apostle's Creed. They know the Lord's Prayer. But people who know them wonder if they know anything about love. Their hearts seem to be hardened.

And if you were to question any of these Christians who fit this description, some of them may respond with, "Well, I admit that I am not that good at loving others. But at least my faith is strong."

Well, I have to question that. If your heart is often consumed with anger, bitterness, cynicism and resentment; if your heart is often devoid of empathy; if you are cruel to others... then I don't believe that your faith is as authentic as you like it to be. Your nose may be in the Bible, but are you absorbing what you are reading? You may be praying to God, but are you just talking and not listening? If you truly have faith in Jesus Christ as your Lord and Savior, then His love should be brimming in your heart, and you should be pouring that love out on others.

On the other end of the spectrum are those whose hearts may be sincerely overflowing with love, but their faith is small, perhaps even non-existent. They include both nominal Christians as well as those who do not profess Christ. It is not uncommon these days to hear people describe themselves as "spiritual." Probably every one of us has friends and maybe even family members who describe themselves as "spiritual." When asked if they are religious or attend church, they might reply like this: "I don't have much use for organized religion. I'm not that sure that there even is a God. And I don't believe that Jesus was raised from the dead. But I am spiritual. I do believe in love, kindness and forgiveness."

And a lot of these spiritual people do tend to have a lot of love in their hearts. They are to be admired for the quality of their empathy and their many acts of kindness. But they lack faith. They may say, "I don't need Jesus in order to love others." But I say that if they had faith in Jesus Christ as their Lord and Savior, they would be pleasantly surprised

to see how much richer their capacity to love would become. Their love would become more colorful and more vibrant. Yes, they may say that love is all you need, but where does love come from? The Apostle John, the disciple whom Jesus loved, tells us in 1st John 4: 8: "God is love."

You believe in love, but you don't believe in its source. Go to the source and your capacity for love will become even stronger.

Paul cited three virtues that we Christians are to abide by: Faith, hope and love, and he listed them in that order. When I read Paul's words and picture those three virtues in that order, I can picture a pendulum. You know: It swings back and forth. Many of us allow that pendulum to swing one way and stop in our hearts. Some Christians put all of their eggs in the basket of faith while neglecting love, while others do the opposite and abide in love but not in faith.

And I believe that when you allow that pendulum to swing only one way in your heart, you are also bypassing that virtue in the middle that Paul mentioned: Hope. Faith without love is also a faith without hope. And love without faith is a love that misses out on the hope of eternal life that God gives to those who embrace His Son.

I said that 1st Corinthian 13 is one of the most beloved chapters in the Bible. By the same token, John 3:16 is arguably the most beloved Bible verse. It is regarded as our faith statement. John 3: 16 begins with Jesus saying, "For God so loved the world that He gave His only begotten Son..."

How beautiful and how powerful a love God has for every man, woman and child that He would sacrifice His own Son! Jesus continues: "... that whoever believes in Him..." There is the "faith" part, if you will, of that unforgettable verse. We are to place our faith in God's only begotten Son. And then Jesus finishes that most beloved of verses with, "... should not perish but have everlasting life."

And there is your hope, brothers and sisters! There is no greater hope that a Christian may have but to receive everlasting life! John 3:16: Faith, hope and love all wrapped in one beautiful verse. Having faith in Jesus Christ gives us the hope of everlasting life. And we receive this hope because of God's unconditional love for us. And because of God's unconditional love for us, we are commanded to love all who were created in His image.

I want to finish this message by giving thanks. As many of you know, I am not the regular preacher, just the substitute. I have wanted to preach on 1st Corinthians 13 for many years, but it just was never on the Lectionary on the Sundays that I have been asked to preach. I therefore want to thank Pastor Darlene Kelley for asking me to fill in for her on a Sunday in which 1st Corinthians 13 was on the Lectionary. Thank you, Darlene! And most of all, I thank God, our Heavenly Father, for the opportunity and the privilege that He has given me today.

And finally, if anyone is wondering why I did not go over why Paul cited love as the greatest of these three virtues, well, we'll just have to pick it up again next year!

In the Name of the Father, the Son and the Holy Spirit! Amen!
